Administrative Board Minutes

December 28, 2009

Moderator Bob Rauland called the meeting of the Administrative Board to order at 7:02pm, on Monday, Dec. 28th. Present in addition to Bob: Peter Gordon—Asst. Moderator/Stewardship, Judy Gildemeister—Music, Andy Pearce—Trustees, Becky Merwin—Pastoral Relations, Jack Meredith, Gary Ruskell—Treasurer, Madeline Zindrick—Clerk. Bob opened the meeting with prayer.

Minutes: The minutes from the last board meeting were approved on a Gordon/Pearce motion.

Moderator's Minute: The services for the past 6 weeks have been outstanding and what Immanuel used to be. We are finally realizing who we are.

Treasurer: We ended November with a balance of \$5,903.15. We won't have to borrow any money through the end of the year. There's \$50.96 from interest in the Endowment that Stewardship will decide for disbursement. The treasurer's report was accepted on a Pearce/Gordon motion.

Trustees: The sinks in the kitchen are fixed and are in the right order of hot & cold now, too. Three benches were ordered for the Food Pantry and the shelving has arrived as well. The budget will need to be adjusted at the annual meeting to reflect the cost for an interim minister.

Diaconate: No report.

CE: No report.

Music: We were just a bit disappointed we had no Christmas Eve services because of the power outage. Nancy has chosen hymns for January.

Stewardship: No report.

Pastoral Relations: Becky made some calls to people that have not been here. We need to start visiting our shut-ins and taking them communion, and maybe that can be part of Immanuel Cares, too. Bob has called on 5 people so far. Peter had brought up **New Business:** Calling Post as an option for us to use in the event of cancellations or meeting announcements as well. Madeline was authorized to set it up and Peter will donate \$50 to cover our first set of calls needed. Our meeting with Dr. Karen King was very enlightening. We know the people in our community better than the UCC does. We're interested in part-time ministry at this time for service every Sunday. Judy wasn't sure we

need to have someone every Sunday. She likes the fact that we've done well within our own ranks of filling the pulpit. Whatever we do it should be temporary before we sign them up for six months. We should address this at the annual meeting. Send a letter out to membership before the annual meeting. We'd like them to submit their thoughts as what's to happen—a survey perhaps. We recognize our financial circumstances don't allow us for full time leadership at this time. What does the congregation want? Come to the meeting and speak out or submit something in writing if you can't be here. Andy wanted to make sure the Homeless Shelter was on the agenda, too. Next Ad Board meeting is Monday, January 25th at 7pm.

The meeting was adjourned on a Gordon/Pearce motion at 8:35pm.

St. Benedict's Friday Fish Fry

The four churches that participate in VBS together will be volunteering to work one of the Fish Fry's at St. Ben's this year to offset the cost of VBS. We are required to have between 5-10 volunteers to work it, plus bake desserts for it. We will need approximately 10 desserts, cakes, bars, cookies, or cupcakes. The sign up sheet will be in the back of the church, or you can call or e-mail Madeline at the office if you wish to volunteer. Our date to work is March 19th.

**A Study of the Gospel of Luke – Chapters
11,12,13 & 14**

Jesus prayed as a regular practice. **Luke chapter 11** begins with, “*One day Jesus was praying*”... the disciples asked to be taught how to pray. In this chapter, we are given an abbreviated version of the Lord’s prayer with additional instruction in the form of a parable. (The complete prayer as we know it today is in Matthew 6:9-13.) In the story of the friend knocking on the door late at night, Jesus is urging believers to come to God with boldness; be persistent with your petitions; God does answer prayer. Jesus continues to be questioned and mistrusted by the Pharisees, who accuse him of casting out demons by the power of Satan. Because they did not believe in spite of all the miracles of healing that Jesus performed and His teaching, the Pharisees continued to ask for more proof that Jesus was the Messiah.

The crowds increased but there were many who did not believe. Jesus calls this a wicked generation. Although they have been given an even greater sign than Jonah, they did not repent and believe as the men of Nineveh did. The eyes are the lamp of the body. If you are in spiritual darkness, you do not need more light, more proof of God; you need better eyes, stronger faith, to see the light. This was told to the Pharisees because they continued to ask for more signs while refusing to accept what they were seeing as being from God.

In response to a Pharisee who was surprised that Jesus did not follow the traditional cleansing ritual added by the Pharisees, Jesus listed six “woes” or warnings concerning current religious practices.

1. You give a tenth, but you neglect justice and the love of God.
2. You love self-importance.
3. You are like unmarked graves; you defile others without their knowing with your false teaching.
4. You give people impossible burdens to bear with strict rules and do nothing to help them.
5. You pretend to honor the prophets, but reject the one they prophesied about.
6. By not believing yourself, you take from others the opportunity to know God.

These strong criticisms increased the opposition from the teachers of the law, and they watched and waited to catch Him in something He might say.

Chapter 12 begins with warnings and encouragement for the disciples. They are warned that they are being watched; nothing is secret, but are told not to be afraid because they are very important to God. The Holy Spirit will give them words to speak when they appear in front of the authorities. The parable of the rich fool warns us not to be so wrapped up in earthly concerns that we neglect our spiritual life. Do not worry, your Heavenly Father knows you need clothing and food and shelter. Have faith and believe. These things will be provided. Be watchful; do not neglect things of the spirit. You do not know when your end will come. There will be judgment for those who know the word of God, but do not live according to it. Jesus talks about the baptism he will have to undergo; His death on the cross; and warns His followers that they will be facing divisions in families for His sake.

In chapter 13, Jesus tells the parable of the fig tree to explain that outward appearance does not show the condition of the heart. The belief at that time was that if something bad happened to someone, they must have sinned in some way. Jesus warns that we are all sinners, and without repentance and forgiveness we will all perish. The fig tree that did not bear fruit is the nation of Israel, or a person who has heard the Word of God, but has not changed as a result. Through grace, God gives us another chance; “*leave it alone for one more year*”, but eventually, if we do not bear fruit, we will be cut down. Jesus continues to heal on the Sabbath Day, and confronts those who criticize Him. The “Kingdom of God” is mentioned over thirty times in the Gospel of Luke. Here it is compared to a mustard seed and yeast, because it starts as a small thing in the hearts of a few and quickly spreads to fill the hearts of a multitude. Not everyone will be saved. Make every effort to enter through the narrow door. If you do not know God, you will knock, and the door will not be opened. Some of the Pharisees warned Jesus to leave Jerusalem because Herod was trying to kill him. Jesus expresses sorrow for Jerusalem, but will not leave because His work is not finished.

Chapter 14 begins with another healing on the Sabbath day. Jesus was being watched

carefully by the Pharisees. As they sat down to eat at the table, he saw the guests picking places of honor at the table and gave them a lesson in humility. Do not consider yourself more important than anyone else in the room. The host may consider someone else more important and you will be embarrassed by being asked to move to a lower position. Rather, consider yourself the lowest, that you will be honored by being placed higher. Also do not host dinners, (treat kindly, or help out) for those who can invite you in return, rather invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind, and then you will be truly blessed. When you are invited to become part of the fellowship of God be ready, go at once. If you do not, the invitation will be withdrawn, and you will no longer be welcome in the house of God. The cost of being a disciple may be great. You can not love anything or anyone more than God. If you are more concerned about your own well being than the will of God, you cannot be a disciple. Hear the Word of the Lord; let the light of God shine in your heart; bear good fruit.

Please join us for discussion of Luke chapters 11, 12, 13 and 14, on Sunday January 31st at 8:00 AM in the Marion Krause room.

In the month of February, continue to read Luke chapters 15, 16, 17 and 18. We will meet to discuss them on February 28th.
